Board of Directors Meeting Minutes March 12, 2000

The Board of Directors meeting was called to order at 8:30 a.m. by President Del Wallis. Those present were President Del Wallis, Secretary Norrine Coyle, Treasurer Richard Bonner, and members Greg Brown, Fred Coleman, Deena Hague, and Bob Snell. Absent and excused were Vice President Jim Morrison, and Ron Hawke.

The invocation was given by Richard Bonner.

MINUTES - By motion (Brown/Snell, unan.), minutes of the February 13, meeting were approved as mailed.

MEMBERS BEFORE THE BOARD - None.

CORRESPONDENCE - A letter was received from the State Department of Health Services concerning "Drinking Water Treatment and Research Fund"; a letter from the U.S. Department of Agriculture concerning workshops regarding maintaining forest and ranch roads in the Sierra Nevada; notice of cancellation of the Park's multi perils policy because the Cambridge General Agency which held the policy was no longer with Acceptance Insurance Company; grant deeds as follows: from Jason and Diane Goins to William Hauff and Alexandra Goch, from James and Dorothy Clifton to Lorance and Mary Ann Notton, from Gerald and Donna Giordano, Daniel and Donna Jean DeSantis and Brian and Deidre Vierra to Danny and Carolyn Mann.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

WATER - Morrison - (absent) Randy reported that 447,300 gallons were used during February. He mentioned that the annual report has to be done by the end of this month.

ROADS - Snell - He will try to get in touch with George Reed next week concerning which roads are in the most need of work and regarding pouring a cement for the garbage bin, which has been discussed previously.

BUILDINGS - Hawke - (absent) No report.

HEALTH AND SAFETY - Hague - People should not park on the Boy Scouts property. To use the toboggan hill, people should park in the cul-de-sac at the end of Jordan Way East.

EQUIPMENT - Brown - New blades are needed for the snow plow. Randy will find out how much they cost. General maintenance work was done on the other equipment.

RECREATION - Coyle/Snell - A successful St. Patrick's dinner was held with the room filled with Park property owners and guests, and musical entertainment by Mr. & Mrs. Freitas. There was a brief discussion of getting fish for the fish derby.

FINANCE - Bonner - Bills for the month totaled \$11,073.81 including \$2,092.50 in timber funds. By motion (Coleman/Hague, unan.) The bills were approved for payment.

TIMBER -Coleman - Will Dorrell, a partner in California Reforestation, Inc. attended the meeting and discussed with the board what needs to be done in various areas to keep our forest healthy. He recommended getting rid of the bear clover in compartments 5 and 6. He will apply for funds from the State to help cover the cost of doing this. If State money is used, the State will not allow us to cut timber in those compartments the same year. We should cut timber in compartment 4 and leave 5 and 6 until next year. By motion (Bonner/Hague, unan.) It was agreed to hire California Reforestation, Inc. To replace Craig Tolmie, the Park's former forester. Mr. Dorrell said his company could clear the tules and algae from the lake and could spray the star thistle in the meadow. It takes two years to get rid of the star thistle.

CARETAKER'S REPORT - Randy reported that they've done a lot of snow plowing. The detailed report is attached to the original copy of the minutes.

OLD BUSINESS - There was a discussion of various types of speed bumps and dips to try and slow down cares going too fast in the park. A new type will be tried in one place to see how well it will work.

NEW BUSINESS - There was a discussion of salary increases for the caretakers. Snowmobile use in the park was discussed. It was agreed that the same rules that are in force for ATVs should be followed. They should be trailored to the cul-de-sac on East Jordan and go into the back country from there. There are so many areas of park land in which little trees have been planted and they can be by the snowmobiles going over them.

The Meeting was adjourned at 10:30 a.m. The next meeting will be April 9, 2000, at 8:30 a.m.
